




85+ Age Group Peaks by 2042


Age Distribution of Seniors in Juneau



Juneau Seniors Participate in the Labor Force




The Majority of Juneau Seniors (65+) Have a PERS/TRS Defined Benefit Retirement




In contrast, 30% of 65+ population nationally receive income from a pension or a 401K.

Median Income for Seniors in Juneau is Higher than Alaska + U.S.






Juneau Has a Higher Proportion of Senior Households (65+) in Upper




Americans (and Alaskans) are Living Longer

Rates of Alzheimer's Increases with Age




Applying Statewide Alzheimer's rates to population estimates and forecasts for Juneau indicate:


Older Americans Have More Chronic Conditions

Data Conclusions


- Senior population is growing but will decline after 2032.
- 85+ population will peak closer to 2040.
- Senior incomes in Juneau tend to be higher but many households are also low income.
- People are living longer; many are active.
- There will be more seniors with dementia and more chronic health conditions.
- Must plan for a mix of active seniors and people needing assistance with activities of daily living.










What are the Options as You Age?

What is Senior Housing?

- Communities where all, or most, of the residents have to be over 55 or 60 years old.
- Often provides activities and a sense of community.
- Can provide services like transportation, meals and housekeeping.
- Can be targeted toward high income households.
- Can include affordable housing for lower income seniors.
- Does not provide assistance with activities of daily living.

What is Assisted Living?

- Assisted Living is a special combination of housing, supportive services, personalized assistance and health care designed to respond to individual needs [1]
- Provides help with activities of daily living
- Provides food and other services
- Nationally, fastest growing segment of long term care.
 - 25 percent of Medicare recipients in a long term care setting are living in assisted living. Up from 15 percent in 1992.²
 - Majority are female (70%)
 - Majority are older (75% over age 75)
- Alaska has 269 assisted living facilities for seniors with 2,394 beds.
- Juneau assisted living is the Pioneer Home, a few assisted living homes for developmentally disabled, and Helping Hands Healing Hearts.

Assisted Living in Juneau





- Juneau Pioneer Home
- 48 beds
- Three levels of care
- Most residents are in their
 70s and 80s
- 85% are diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia
- 97 on active wait list
- 1,573 on inactive wait list

What is a Skilled Nursing Facility?

- Typically near by or associated with a hospital
- Provides 24 hour medical care by nursing staff
- Skilled nursing levels have decreased from 4.5% to 3.1% nationally.





Juneau 60+









Senior Housing: Raven Landing in Fairbanks









- 60 apartments in three buildings, fourth phase planned
- \$1,895 for I bedroom (includes \$635 service fee)
- \$2,360 for 2 bedroom (includes a \$635 service fee)
- Waitlist of 130; 20 ready to move in
- 6 required low income
- Average age 65-75

Senior Housing + Assisted Living: Primrose Retirement Community in Wasilla



- 76 apartments, 6 villas (two bedroom)
- 70% full
- No dementia care
- Senior Housing 36 units, \$3,070 for a 1 bedroom
- Assisted Living 40 units \$4565 a month + \$425 to \$1600








- 154 units of Medicaid assisted living attached by breezeway to 86 units of senior affordable housing (Esperanza)
- Social hub is on assisted living side to allow oversight and care of senior housing residents
- Assisted living ~ \$2972
- Senior housing ~\$774/month (income qualified)
 - All meals \$250/month or \$2.50/meal

Sun City Retirement Communities



- One member of the household must be 55 yrs. old, no one under 19.
- Children visiting can only stay a max of 90 days.
- Yard and shrubs must be kept up.
- No sheds or storage buildings allowed
- Recreation fees less than \$300

Options for Payment

- Unpaid Family Members The majority of long term care services are not paid for at all but are performed by unpaid family members.
- Out of Pocket Households pay for services they can afford.
- Long Term Care Insurance Long term care insurance is an option to pay for long term care services.
 24% of Juneau Seniors are covered by LTCi. In Alaska, only 2.9% of people age 40+ have a policy in effect.

Options for Payment


- Medicaid Medicaid is a major source of funding for long term care. After exhausting personal resources, most long term care recipients become eligible for Medicaid coverage.
 - Must be income qualified and have a minimum level of care needed
- Medicare Medicare pays for time limited nursing home stays that are transitional and rehabilitative in nature; it will also pay for limited home health services if there is registered nurse oversight and the services are therapeutic.
- Pioneer Home Payment Assistance Sliding scale depending on income.



Willingness to Pay for Assisted Living (Per Month)






